AGBO STAGES RALLY OWEN MOTORING CLUB



AGBO Rally 2021 has been rescheduled, it will not take place on its usual March slot, the new date is **Sunday September 26th.** This decision was taken early on in the year by the event team due to unknown restrictions which may be in force during March with Covid 19 situation.

It will be a new look AGBO, as we have lost the use of the Bradford Estate section of road (we call the back road). This is due to a breakdown in the relationship between Weston Park & Bradford Estates management teams, nothing to do with OMC.

Weston Park have vetoed the building of a gravel access road, accessed to the left 800m in from Lichfield Gate. This will traverse the fields over to the tarmac road at the stone pillars just inside the Weston estate boundary. This will allow us to run the section of road going into the park in the opposite direction from our usual, something we have been requested to do for a long time. We only lose 300M of stage without the Bradford section, a result for us as we get the decent stretch at no extra cost (previously extortionate).

This will be a bonus in more ways than one as the Bradford estate section always caused on event problems, usually costly and always time consuming. If the new gravel road does not materialise we will revert to the old format AGBO Rally, on the roads available in the central estate areas as we used to do 20 years ago.

The event will conform to Motorsport UK post Covid event rules, with self certification for scrutineering & signing on. This will save much time for the organisational teams. MSUK scrutineers will be present at the event to carry out random checks. All cars are required to noise test prior to the start. Any Covid restrictions applying at that time will be adhered to.

At the time of writing in February, we have no confirmation that Jaspers Bakeries will continue to support our event. Their company premises in Newport has closed, Penkridge remains open. We are deeply indebted to Mark Jasper proprietor of "Jaspers Bakeries" for his extremely generous support of the AGBO Stages for the last three years.

However, we do have a promise from a competitor, an OMC club member, of some financial support, obviously at this stage unconfirmed. The event will require some sponsorship from somewhere, with ever escalating costs in all directions things are getting pretty tight. Close control on the budget should enable OMC to hold the entry fee at the 2020 level. As of March 2021 we have no championships asking to use the September event, we are open to any offers, contact Anton Bird.



50 YEARS ON, ARK RACING AT NÜRBURGRING and JARAMA by Brian Austin

Ark Racing from Willenhall had its first race overseas in 1970, when it competed in Germany and Spain with the Ark Sprite Twin Cam. This car is a Ford-based sports prototype, the only thing Sprite about it being the low-profile body.

It was designed and built over the first six months of 1970 and had its first race at Cadwell Park in July, after being withdrawn after practice at three other races earlier that month. It proved itself in August at Silverstone, coming second overall in the Birkitt six-hour relay race.

It was then felt ready for its first international race, the 500 km at Nurburgring, Germany, for which it would be paid to race. The Ark team arrived in time for owner driver John Banks to have two days practice before the event. Autosport magazine said "John Banks brought along his Arksprite, which had a monocoque centre with a spaceframe to take its twin-cam engine and wishbone front suspension. At the back, a Ford beam axle and dampers, the car looking very businesslike on its 9-inch and 10-inch rims".

Favorite for the race was Brian Redman in a new works Chevron B16 Spyder but the car caught fire after 13 laps and allowed Chris Craft (Lola T210) to take the lead until he put a rod through the sump, followed by a dual between the works Chevron B16 of Vic Elford and the works Abarth of Arturo Merzario, Quick Vic eventually taking the flag.

The Arksprite ran in the middle of the field for most of the race but in the closing stages had to retire with a seized differential. As it had completed most of the race, it was classed as a finisher and was awarded second in class, behind the Lola T210 of Max Wilson.

This was John's first ride at the ring, and he reckoned it needed a couple more visits before he would get to know it. "The bumpy circuit put paid to the diff-plus sideways hops over the bumps at around 130mph -to which beam axles don't take kindly."

After a run in October at a GT Race at Thruxton, the Ark now felt ready for its next European adventure – the Madrid 6 hours at Jarama, Spain's only long-distance race, in November. A team of six people made the trip, drivers John Banks and Chris Smith plus reserve driver Arthur Collier, constructor Derek Matthews and mechanics Ray Concar and Ivan Follos, all in a Ford Thames van towing Arksprite.

The entry list showed the first four cars, all Porsche 908's, to be piloted by F1 drivers, Alex Soler -Roig, Jo Siffert, Reine Wisell and Niki Lauda, although Lauda withdrew before the race. Each car had a co-driver of variable ability which had some considerable bearing on the race which was won by Soler-Roig from Wisell and Siffert in that order.

The Arksprite qualified 24th out of 29 starters but moved up to 17th overall and 2nd in class at 82 laps when, with Chris Smith at the wheel, a front upright collapsed and that was that.

That evening the team attended the prize giving at El Cerebro, a top Madrid night spot where guests included Jo Siffert, Alain de Cadenet and Pedro Rodriguez. The team needed the £200 start money to help get back home and were therefore paid in cash instead of cheque.

They were told of a race in Tangier the following weekend and, if they could get the car repaired, were offered £400 to take part, but one of the team members had to return home so the invite was declined. The team therefore left for England that evening, doing a non-stop journey home.



Owen Motoring Club celebrate 60 years. Written for BRMA magazine by REVS editor.

Rubery Owen has a long standing reputation as one of the Black Country's foremost giants of industry, with a history stretching back to 1884. John T. Rubery and his two brothers established a very modest factory in Booth Street Darlaston and began to manufacture light steel goods. In less than ten years both the brothers had left the company and John who remained was on the look out for a new partner. This partner emerged as a 24 year old from Denbighshire named Alfred Ernest Owen.

Initially the new business expanded into the then booming bicycle trade followed by the appearance of the Motor Car and becoming a pioneer in supply of parts to the industry. This was to remain as core business for most of the company's existence, they also got heavily into steel works as many new factory premises were being erected. The wheels of the motor industry began to move even faster thus the company grew significantly, as a result in 1905 the name we are familiar with today, Rubery Owen & Co. was formed. In 1910 John Rubery retired from the business and under sole proprietorship of Alfred Ernest Owen the firm went from strength to strength. Alfred died in 1929 but the organisation had been widely recognised as unique in character, a company of many trades including motor frames, wheels, structural steel work, aviation parts and also aircraft.

Now an employer of 1600 workers under Mr A.E Owen the company was recognised as being a pioneer of industry and also industrial welfare. The company probably the first in the UK to provide for its staff, a recreation ground, bowling greens, tennis courts, a works canteen, staff dining rooms, billiards rooms and reading rooms, all new in the Black Country Industrial workplace. The company was also a founder member of the Industrial Welfare Society.

Alfred's two sons Alfred and Ernest took over the reins of the company after the death of their father and soon realised a great engineering tradition had to be maintained and further developed. By 1951 the company employed over 12,000 people and the diversity of manufactured goods increased. In December 1959 the Owen Organisation Motoring Club was formed by a group of motoring enthusiasts employed by Rubery Owen in Darlaston. The company now the largest privately owned engineering concern in the UK and due to Sir Alfred Owen's enthusiasm.

The former O.O.M.C (now Owen Motoring Club Ltd.) have always had a very close affiliation with the BRM organisation, the formation of the factory car club was initially to raise funds to support the newly formed British Motor Racing Association Trust who were building the first British F1 race car.

Sir Alfred was responsible for rescuing the BRM F1 racing team, becoming the main benefactor, it was saved from almost extinction and rose to take the F1 world constructors championship also taking the F1 drivers title with Graham Hill at the wheel. It was Sir Alfred who gave Jackie Stewart his first ever F1 start with the BRM team. Jackie quickly became a great friend of Graham Hill the resident BRM F1 driver at the time, a long lasting relationship which also included the great Jim Clark, until Grahams untimely death in November 1975 when his light aircraft crashed on Arkley Golf Course whilst attempting to land at Elstree Airport at night in thick fog.









Graham Hill donated an ex F1 BRM steering wheel (one of only two in existence) to OMC in 1965. This was mounted and used as the FTD award at the OMC "Graham Hill Sprint" for 51 years. In 2015 the wheel was retired due to its delicate condition and was replaced by a very good replica which was made by "Motalita". The original wheel was donated by OMC to the Bourne Heritage Trust Museum along with other BRM F1 race winning trophies which were donated to them by Rubery Owen. It was felt the collection would be more visible there than in the then head office boardroom of Rubery Owen, Darlaston.

The OMC / BRM association has long remained in place, Bette Hill and daughter Samantha attended the OMC 25th anniversary dinner. Neville Hay and Nick Mason then owner of the V16 BRM race car, (now owned by Bernie Eccleston) attended the clubs 40th anniversary evening at the National Motor Cycle Museum near Birmingham. Another great honour for our club in 2010 when Sir Jackie Stewart accepted the offer from David Owen OBE, Club President, to attend as our guest of honour for the 50th anniversary celebration night, a glittering occasion with Jackie on top form, also presenting the annual club championship awards with some very entertaining commentary. A special award was presented by Jackie on the night to the then long time chairman of the club, the late Tony Matthews. This was for his continuous 51 year stint as the Clerk of the Course for the OMC "Graham Hill Sprint" this being a British Championship round for many of those years.






Owen Motoring Club as it is now known reached a milestone in December 2019 celebrating its 60th anniversary. A reunion party was held at the clubs HQ, Great Barr Golf Club, when over Eighty members past and present attended. In honour of this anniversary, club member for over 40 years Anton Bird, has timed the publication of his book about the exploits of the clubs rallying events to coincide with this years celebrations. "Owen Motoring Club Rally History" a comprehensive guide through the years from the first motorsport offering from its new members in April 1960. Obviously, a keen membership as the club was only formed in the previous December and a rally produced in no time at all. The book is a comprehensive guide through the twists and turns of the club's involvement in UK club rallying from its humble beginnings to the present day.

The author states it has been an absolute joy to have been able to bring together in one volume as many aspects as possible to one of the clubs core activities, including as many statistics as it has been possible to actually find, a labour of love that has taken five years research, a year to write and finally into print in May 2019. From its formation the Club have always been based around the Walsall area, its experienced members organising and running events throughout the calendar in all facets of club motorsport. These include Production Car Trials, Auto Solo's, Auto Tests, a Sprint at Curborough and a very successful two day Stage Rally at Weston Park in March each year. Many of the events organised are included in National championships.



Many were presented to the club by Rubery Owen & BRM employees including, Graham Hill, Tony Rudd, Rivers Fletcher, Grace Owen, John Owen, David Owen OBE, Chris Shorrocks and Peter Spear RO company Director of Research. These are utilised for the many of the clubs motorsport championships that are hotly contested by its members every year. In 1988 our once only English World Rally Champion Richard Burns joined OMC to take part in one of our stage rallies at the start of his glittering career. The club thrives today with over 200 members, not all active of course, still presenting events for all facets of club motorsport which has always been and will remain its core focus.

OMC also have a rapidly growing and very active classic car section, attending many shows every year including the prestigious NEC classic three day show in November. A very successful classic car tour christened "The Tony Matthews Classic Car Tour" named after our long serving former club chairman has also been in its calendar for many years, ably organised by club members. Event marshalling with the club can be very rewarding usually meaning you can get closer to the action. Many types of motorsport event are covered and not just in the UK, rallies in Belgium have also been on the agenda.

Including Froilan Gonzalez, who flew in from Argentina to drive the V16 BRM which in the early 1950's he raced in Formula Libre.

Poor field on E.C. Payter

ON SEPTEMBER 22 Paul Derry proved that his 13th overall on this year's Welsh was no flash in the pan by dominating the E. C. Payter Rally. Setting fastest time on eight of the fourteen special stages, Derry won this Owen Organisation M.C. event by four minutes.

Midland and Castrol-Timpson Rallies, OOMC expected a full entry for their first venture into stage rally organisation but, for some strange reason, only 37 crews turned up to compete for the enormous list of awards.

Starting from the Hilton Park M6 Services, the route incorporated most of the usual together with tree or four new ones. The first stage was along the wellknown canal towpath near Tamworth, where Derry set fastest time, ten seconds ahead of John Bloxham in the Birmingham Post Gp1 Avenger. Stages two and three were on the old army camp at Marchington, whilst four was an autocross type section across a couple of fields near Sudbury Prison. Short stages at Hixon airfield and Teddesley Park brought competitors to the superb 16-mile stage on Perton airfield. A

With the non-appearance of the mixture of tarmac and loose gravel, this really sorted the men from the boys, and Derry put the power of his Escort to good advantage, being over a minute faster than second man Mike Cockayne.

> Half way results showed Derry on 7m 13s, 1m 13s ahead of Jim Noble's Lothian Sports Cars Escort, with Bloxham third.

Heavy rain made conditions stages on maps 119 and 120, extremely slippery on the afternoon stages, all on map 119, and Derry Stage 11, at Loggerheads, Bloxham met a chicken crossing the road and was forced to slow down for it as the farmer's wife was spectating! The yump halfway along the Millington stage, near Oakengates, caught out those who thought it was flat (it isn't!) and R. Morgan put his Avenger GT well off on a put his Avenger GT well off on a 1, Derry/Pocock (Escort), 66m 40s; 2, square right into about a foot of Yorke/Lowe (Cooper S), 70m 35s; 3, called it).
